Building from the Introduction to Social Work course (SW203), this course expands the student's awareness of the professional nature and meaning of generalist social work practice. It examines the National Association of Social Work Code of Ethics in relationship to practice, and provides an introduction to interpersonal communication with an emphasis on development of one-to-one interviewing and documentation. (Borrowed from University of Alaska at Fairbanks). Prerequisites: SW203, and MA087. (Offered Fall semester)
